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John 1: 1-5

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life,* and the life was the light of all people. With Jesus, we do not have to walk alone on our journey. He walks with us. He sits with us in quiet moments. He cries with us and he celebrates with us. He is pained with us and he comforts us. This advent season as we prepare the way for Jesus, may we always remember to turn to God first. May His wisdom prevail, not ours. May we remember this advent that "without him not one thing came into being."
